#### **News from our CEO**

The New Aged Care standards commenced on July 1st, 2019. Our board and staff have been busy attending information/training sessions on what the new standards mean for them in their roles at Riverview. The new Standard 8 now holds Aged Care Provider boards more accountable for the delivery of quality care and services, than they have ever been before.

The focus of Standard 1 is on Dignity and Choice. Our staff have been talking to our residents about what dignity means to them, this may be different for everyone. What is important to someone is not necessarily important to someone else. important that we treat each resident in the way "they would like to be treated" and not necessarily in the way "we would like someone to treat us" as that could be very different to what a resident would actually like. It is therefore very important that our staff understand this, many people were raised being taught to "do unto others as you would like done unto yourself", however the new standards really flip this on its head, it is now "do unto others what they would like done unto them", but firstly we need to find out what that is, therefore it is important that we have these conversations with each and every resident.

Whilst the New Aged Care legislation refers to Residents as Consumers, our Residents have exercised their choice and decided at a Resident meeting that they would prefer to be known as Residents, rather than Consumers as per the new legislation, therefore here at Riverview, we will continue to use the word Resident, rather than Consumer.

Our new Chapel and Wellbeing centre is currently out for tender. Tenders close mid-August, so we hope to be in a position to appoint a builder and have further information regarding timeframes for the project by the next newsletter. The Board of Riverview Lutheran Rest Home Inc is currently in the process of recruiting a new board member with Clinical Skills under a Clinical Governance Scholarship, (the successful recipient will receive a scholarship to undertake Governance training with the Australian Institute of Company Directors in return for a minimum of 2 terms on our board) We should also be in a position to announce the successful applicant/new board member in next month's newsletter.

We are currently in the process of calling a Pastor to Riverview and would appreciate your prayers as we undertake this process. At the time of writing I am not quite able to announce who the Pastor that will be called is, but we hope to be able to do this in time for the Lutheran Parish bulletin for the first Sunday in August.

Our Serviced Apartments are currently 100% occupied, however we do have vacancies for either rental or purchase options in our cottages. Our rental options are very affordable and are a great alternative to licence to occupy (purchase) retirement living. If you know of anyone who would like to live independently in one of our cottages without the commitment of purchasing, Annie would be very happy to show them through.

#### News from the DON

Wow! Just like that we are at the end of July. The shortest day has been, and we are looking forward to the longer and warmer days for our residents to be able to get out an enjoy our beautiful sunshine.

I am sure you are all aware of the changes to the Aged Care Quality standards, and that they are now being implemented by all Aged Care Facilities in Australia as of the 1st of July. Our staff and Board have been receiving education about the new standards over the past several months.

As the DON I wanted to share some information about Clinical Governance and how this will look for Riverview. Management and Board have been working to develop a framework that sits behind this new standard and this will be implemented for our organisation.

Clinical governance provides a system through which managers and the clinical team are jointly accountable for resident safety and quality care. Good clinical governance places an emphasis on systematic approaches to safety and quality, rather than reactive, short-term fixes. It draws on the experiences of residents and the contributions of all staff, as well as organisation-level strategies and continuous quality improvement.

The Riverview Board will be selecting a new board member that has clinical experience to assist with the guidance and support of the clinical team.

Management will be monitoring the clinical quality and safety performance which now includes collection and review of data relating to the experience of consumers, as well as clinical risk, practice, and outcomes. Clinical quality and safety performance are reported to the governing body, workforce and residents.

From the 1st of July 2019 all Commonwealth subsidised residential aged care providers will be required to comply with the National Mandatory Quality Indicator Program. The three quality indicators which services are required to collect and submit are

- Pressure injuries
- Use of physical restraint
- Unplanned weight loss.

The importance of labelling EVERYTHING Have you lost your glasses? We currently have 8 pairs in the office that have built up over a number of years, none of which are labelled. If you would like to look though this box, please speak to the Nurse in your section e.g. Traeger or Edwards. And request them to be labelled.

We ENGRAVE items for FREE, just bring them to office.

Clothing is at a cost of \$50 FOR LIFE. Our new labelling machine can withstand our HOT WASHES and makes it easy for staff to identify who's items are who's.

Having EVERYTHING labelled, Clothes, hearing aids, glasses, electrical equipment, shoes, Blankets and rugs, makes it easier for staff to find their owners, if you are missing items of clothing, please check the lost property at the alternative entrance (staff can assist if required.) and request for items to be labelled if they are yours.

Clothing labelled with permanent marker are requested to have the new heat proof labels, as they will wash off.

In accordance with the Riverview Food Safety Plan, we accept no responsibility for food items supplied directly to residents by friends or family members and these food items can neither be processed, handled nor distributed by any Riverview staff member (with the exception of supplying required utensils to enable their consumption if so required).

# **Equipment testing and tagging FOR FREE?**

Please make sure you advise Reception staff before bringing in any new equipment or furniture (especially electrical) as we want to make sure our Residents room are the safest possible places.

#### What is the IDDSI Framework?

Some people have problems feeding, chewing or swallowing. This means some foods and drinks are a danger for choking or for material to 'go down the wrong way' and into the airway.

The International Dysphagia Diet Standardisation Initiative (IDDSI), through consultation and following best practice principles, has developed a global standardized way of describing foods and drinks that are safest for people with feeding, chewing or swallowing problems. The Framework can be used for people of all ages, in all care settings and can by applied to all cultures.

Simple measurement methods are included in the Framework. These measurement methods confirm the IDDSI Level a food or drink belongs to, or if it is unsafe for people with feeding, chewing or swallowing problems.
